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

Message from the President, Friends of Olympic National Park



2024 has been a busy year for FONP, as we completed the volunteer events that we've done historically, but also added some new ones—such as the East Beach graffiti cleanup and the herbarium digitization project. Particularly gratifying was the graffiti removal work, which was done in close coordination with ONP staff in an eco-friendly way. Special thanks to FONP member Desiree Marble, who brought the project to us and Leah Santasiero from the ONP Youth and Volunteer Office for your efforts. Within the national park archives, the herbarium project is ongoing as photographs of over 7000 plant specimens are being taken and catalogued online. Joey Gish from Peninsula College and Matt Lebeau from ONP are leading this project.

Patrick Williams was welcomed to the FONP board this month. He came to the peninsula from Texas and has been an active volunteer in the park from north to south. His enthusiasm is a welcome asset for our group.

Our Facebook group has grown to over 80,000 members and presents an opportunity to educate and share up-to-date information about the park. We are grateful to Lee Snook, Chief of Interpretation for Olympic National Park for helping us refine and present the most accurate information regarding park fees and passes to potential visitors. Thank you also to board member Dori Broglino, who has provided FB statistics for board review, and created multiple event posts for members. Facebook AI was invaluable at helping our monitors stay caught up with the large number of posts this summer, and we continue to modify the AI rules so that posts remain relevant.

At this moment, we have approximately 50 paid annual memberships. These donations are our financial core, and we appreciate all those who contribute in this way. We have also added some new private donors, as well as accepted legacy donations in honor of those who have passed. The FONP board determines how to best funnel our monies back towards support of the park, staff and our volunteers. Friends of Olympic National Park <u>Historical Perspective:</u>

CCC Structures in Olympic National Park

The Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) was developed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt as part of the New Deal program to help the country recover from the Great Depression. The program ran from 1933 to 1942, and it put many unemployed young men to work on conservation projects in America's parks and forests. Ultimately, more than 3 million young men would cycle through the program. The timing was fortuitous for Olympic National Park, which was established in 1938 by Franklin D. Roosevelt and was in need of additional infrastructure. The CCC helped construct the following structures in the Park:

Olympic National Park Headquarters:

CCC construction of the ONP headquarters began in 1939 and was completed in 1941. The building is known for its rustic style and is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

<u>Sol Duc Falls Shelter (also known as the Canyon Creek Shelter)</u>: This is the last remaining trail shelter in ONP that was constructed by the CCC. Two similar CCC trail shelters - - at Moose Lake and Hoh Lake - - no longer exist. Sol Duc Falls Shelter is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

<u>**Roads:**</u> The CCC was very involved in helping build and/or improve numerous roads in the Park, including those to Olympic Hot Springs, Deer Park (a road that was nicknamed "The Highway of the CCC", and Heart of the Hills.

Campgrounds & Other Facilities: The CCC was instrumental in creating and improving many Park campgrounds. This work included building roads, trails, camping spots, installing playground equipment, establishing reliable water supplies, and building community kitchens. The last 2 remaining CCC campground kitchens were located at the Elwha and Altaire Campgrounds. These kitchens are no longer accessible due to the freely meandering Elwha River which has overtaken these sites within the last 10 years. The CCC also helped develop campgrounds at Olympic Hot Springs, Deer Park, and Heart of the Hills; they also helped with development of the La Poel picnic area at Lake Crescent. And, they were responsible for improvements to the Elwha Ranger Station.

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Friends of Olympic National Park <u>Youth Volunteer / Intern Leadership Award:</u> Jamie Robinson

Jamie started volunteering at the Matt Albright Native Plant Nursery in March of 2024. Since then, she has completed over 48 hours of volunteer service here. 
I am honored to be part of this dedicated team and look forward to working together to protect and enhance the beauty of ONP for future generations.


⁹ Friends of Olympic National Park <u>Volunteer Opportunity:</u>


Looking for a great way to volunteer for Olympic National Park this fall/winter? Join the team of people working on digitizing the herbarium in the Olympic National Park archives. The herbarium contains around 7000 plant specimens preserved and labeled in manila folders. Each page is photographed by volunteers and entered in the computer. The result will be an online database which will be available to the public through the Consortium of Northwest Herbaria. To date, we are about halfway through the project. We could use approximately 4-5 more volunteers.

Training will take place primarily on Tuesday or Wednesday mornings. You will learn how to access the archives, care for plant specimens, log entries in the computer and take high quality specimen photographs. You can work as many or as few hours as you like. The herbarium project takes place at the Cultural Resources Building, 600 E. Park Ave, Port Angeles. Work can be done solo or as a pair.

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




